presence of my inner world," she said. "I knew it was mine to do. This was my world."

After graduating and spending some time travelling, Amine came to Santa Barbara to visit her sister and never left. "I've produced art

of some kind every single day I've been here for the past 40 vears," she said. "Santa Barbara is my homeland. My village." In addition to her painting, dancing, and shrine-making, Amine has also created several public art pieces and painted murals in the community, such as the whale at Moby Dick's, a mural at Monroe Elementary, and the meditation room at Unity Church. She regularly teaches dance and shrine-making workshops throughout the community.

"I hope people come away from my artwork with a sense of wonder and
